

SADPA

- Stages are designed to be realistic self defence scenarios.
- No “speed rigs” or competition only equipment allowed. No Optics. No compensators. Firearms must be in production or had a production run of 20 000
- Holsters may be IWB (inside waistband) or OWB (outside waistband)
- Firearm and magazines must be carried concealed.
- Magazine capacity limited to 10 rounds only. Magazines limited to three in total.
- Firearms must be mainly of factory configuration with only limited modifications allowed.
- Target has only three scoring zones and scores are calculated very easily.
- Provision is made for almost every factory based firearm, including revolvers. (9mm or bigger)
- Divisions include:
 - SSP – Stock Service Pistol. Striker fired and double action pistols.
Typical firearms include CZ75, BHP, Glock 17, 19, Beretta 92
 - ESP – Enhanced Service pistol. Single action and striker fired pistols.
Typical firearms include CZ75, Glock, SIG, STAR model B, Beretta 92
 - CDP – Custom Defensive Pistol. 45ACP semi auto only class.
Typical firearms include Colt 1911, Glock21
 - CCP – Compact Carry Pistol. Typical Glock 19 or smaller.
 - REV – Revolver class but limited to barrel length of 4.2”
 - BUG – Back-Up Gun. Sub compact class for very small 9mm pistols and snub nose revolvers with max barrel length of 3”.
- You will compete against similarly skilled shooters as yourself.
- Classifications include: Novice, Marksman, Sharpshooter, Expert, Master.
- Must complete a NSO (New Shooter Orientation) before you may compete and get dedicated sport status points. NSO includes a “Classifier” stage to determine your skill level.
- Includes DMG (Defensive Multi Gun) where you are allowed to license restricted firearms once you have obtained DSS (Dedicated Sport Status) including semi auto shotguns and rifles.
- Each club shoot earns you 4 points, leagues 6 points. You need 20 points per year for DSS. SADPA is accredited to the CFR as a sport shooting organisation.
- Able to shoot at any SADPA affiliated club in RSA and the world (IDPA).



INTERNATIONAL PRACTICAL SHOOTING CONFEDERATION

IPSC shooting is dynamic, challenging, and one of the fastest growing shooting sports in the world today. Courses of fire utilize many aspects not found in the more traditional shooting disciplines such as movement by the shooter, moving targets, multiple targets, and the freedom for the shooter to solve the shooting challenges presented in the courses of fire.

IPSC matches are based on the principles of accuracy, power and speed. The matches are varied and based on the safe use of the handgun. Participation in these matches will develop a high degree of safety and proficiency, as well as providing an exciting means of recreation.

You will see standard stock firearms as well as exotic custom guns in IPSC competitions

The appeal of the sport lies in the diversity of the courses of fire available to the shooter. By offering different courses of fire rather than set types, IPSC shooting continues to challenge the competitor and to improve his skills.
